Dear Family.

Greetings to the faithful! Sadly, I have to tell you of the passing of two of our senior family members. Alice Laura Copleston Smith, sister of the late Frederick Elford Copleston, last of the line of Rectors of Offwell and aunt of Hermione, died in Exmouth on October 24th, aged 91. Willis Copleston of Flint died on November 20th aged 83 years, 10 months. I had been missing his long and enthusiastic letters during his illness and it doesn't seem possible that they will not be coming any more. Clwyd Family History Society will miss his presence and the articles he wrote for their Journal. Our condolences to both families.

David has recently had an operation, but is now recovered and returned to work - it was good to speak with was neglected for a while but I am now 'back in the saddle' and some interesting things have come to light, not only from my own searches, but with the help of others.

You may remember that I found a Gabriel Copleston(e) living in Southampton in the early 1600's with sons apprenticed to him (he was a cutler). He is the only Gabriel in the family, except for his grandson; we have no idea where he originated but Dorothy Martin did some searching at the Record Office in Southampton and found that in 1608 he was living in Windmill Lane (now Regent Street) and in French Street at No. 239 in 1620. She sent a photocopy of an extract from a Southampton Record Society publication telling of 'Edith wingham wife of Nichollas wingha' of bramsher (Bramshaw) in the new forrest Tayler: presented for a newcommer in the windmill Lane at Gabriell Copstones'. Although there is no indication of Gabriel's origins 'his does put flesh on his bones and gives hope of further discoveries. Thank you, Dorothy!

A delightful surprise in the summer was the receipt from Jeremy Copleston in Coxsackie NY of a number of photocopies of some of Edwin the painter's landscapes, photographs taken during his father Lancelot's visit to England probably around 1900 of members of the Attwood family and the villages in which they lived. One photograph is of Emily Copleston and another young woman not named; two of the pictures include Lancelot, but since this was soon after the time of Edwin's second disappearance there is no mention of him! It is a frustrating search for the enigmatic Edwin and we don't even know when and where he died. I did, however, look at the Census for Wheathamstead where the Attwoods were living in 1851 and found Edwin's wife Eliza aged 20, a straw plaiter, with father Joseph, mother Charlotte, sister Harriet and brother George. I have written to an Attwood living in Wheathampstead, but three months later have had no reply, so will try another one! Someone, somewhere, must have the answer to the mystery.

To go back 750 years through our family history, I ordered the entry from the Devon Feet of Fines at the PRO (and as always when holding these ancient documents in my hands, was awestruck) regarding the Manor of Colebrooke in which the Querent was Walter de Bathe and the Deforciant Hugo de Sancto Vedasto in 1240. I have ordered a copy, which is not yet to hand, but it is witnessed by William de Copleston and I believe that Richard is mentioned in the document, which I shall have translated from the Latin as soon as possible. This, together with the Essoin of 1200 in which Richard de Copleston represented Muriel de Bruer, proves that we are not, as stated in the illumination in St. Andrew's Church, Colebrooke, St. Vedasts! I will ask permission of the PRO to reproduce the copy document for family members and those of you who would like a copy please send an A4 s.a.e. plus one 2nd class stamp to cover photocopying. I already have permission to copy the document of 1200 and the same applies in respect of this.

Larry Copleston of Mississauga, Ontario, has sent the details of his family to add to the 'A' pedigree. have given this 'A.9.i' to add to the end of the pedigree (it still grows!) and will send it for the usual s.a.e. + 15p stamp. The Flower Festival at Crediton was beautiful and the Cup looked very handsome under a glass bell by the West door of Holy Cross. For new readers, this is a replica of the Grace Cup given to John Copleston DD by Charles II in 1683 and it represented one of the 'West Country Worthies' - the theme of this year's Festival in June.
